



2020 ISU FIGURE SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS SELECTION CRITERIA

The following describes the process Skate Canada will undertake in the selection of athletes who will represent Canada at the following ISU Championships:

2020 ISU Four Continents Figure Skating Championships
2020 ISU World Figure Skating Championships
2020 ISU World Junior Figure Skating Championships

The Skate Canada High Performance Development Committee will nominate to the CEO the selection of athletes at the conclusion of the 2020 Canadian Tire National Skating Championships in Mississauga, ON in January 2020. The CEO will immediately present to the Board of Directors the list of provisional nominations for ratification. In the event that the Board of Directors does not ratify the nominations, the Board will delegate the final approval to the Athlete Selection Resolution Working Group. The Board will immediately submit comments to the Athlete Selection Resolution Working Group who will hold the final decision in resolving the conflict between the nominations and the Board of Director's comments. The Athlete Selection Resolution Working Group will consist of the Chair of the High Performance Development Committee, the High Performance Director (HPD) for Four Continents and World Championships and Next Gen Director for Junior World Championships and President or designate (as determined by the President).

2020 ISU WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS Montreal, Canada March 16 – 22, 2020

Pursuant to ISU rules and regulations, Skate Canada is entitled to a maximum of the following entries:

Men	-	1 entries
Ladies	-	2 entries
Pairs	-	2 entries
Dance	-	3 entries

The process described above will be followed however it is possible that not all athlete entries will be named until the conclusion of the 2020 ISU Four Continents . With the ISU point and qualifying system in place at the 2020 ISU World Championships, and its impact on entries to various 2021 ISU Championships, the decision as to the athletes to be named must meet the following eligibility requirements:

1. ISU Minimum Technical Score (Appendix i)
2. Age requirements as per ISU Rule 108:
"Skaters may compete who have reached at least the age of fifteen (15) before July 1st preceding the event (July 1, 2019)"

And will then take into account, in no specific order, the following criteria:

- Placement at the 2020 Canadian Championships
- Placement at the 2020 ISU Four Continents Championships (if required)
- Qualifying for the 2019/20 ISU Grand Prix Final
- Results and scores from the 2018-2019 and / or the 2019-2020 ISU Grand Prix Series, Senior International events and / or ISU Grand Prix Final.
- Top 10 placement at the 2019 ISU World Championships
- Top 10 placement at the 2018 Olympic Winter Games in the specific discipline
- Demonstration of consistent short and free skate scores for a potential world placement in the top three flights.

Skaters who did not compete at the 2020 Canadian Championships or internationally during the 2019-2020 season may be selected to the 2020 ISU World Championship Team based on the following criteria:

- Medalist from the 2018 and/or 2019 ISU World Championships
- Medalist from the 2018 Olympic Winter Games in the specific discipline
- Medalist from the 2018/19 ISU Grand Prix Final

2020 ISU FOUR CONTINENTS CHAMPIONSHIPS
Seoul, Korea
February 3 - 9, 2020

Pursuant to ISU rules and regulations, Skate Canada is entitled to a maximum of the following entries:

Men	-	3 entries
Ladies	-	3 entries
Pairs	-	3 entries
Dance	-	3 entries

With the ISU point and qualifying system in place, athlete selection will be based on the following eligibility requirements:

1. ISU Minimum Technical Score (Appendix i)
2. Age requirements as per ISU Rule 108:
"Skaters may compete who have reached at least the age of fifteen (15) before July 1st preceding the event (July 1, 2019)"

And will then take into account, in no specific order, the following criteria:

- Placement at the 2020 Canadian Championships
- Qualifying for the 2019/20 ISU Grand Prix Final
- Results and scores from the 2018-2019 and/or 2019-2020 ISU Grand Prix Series, Senior International events and / or ISU Grand Prix Final.
- Placement / performance at the 2019 ISU World Championships and 2018 Olympic Winter Games
- Demonstration of consistent short and free skate scores for a potential world placement in the top three flights.

Skaters who did not compete at the 2020 Canadian Championships or internationally during the 2019-2020 season may be selected based on the following criteria:

- Medalist from the 2018 and /or 2019 ISU World Championships
- Medalist from the 2018 Olympic Winter Games in the specific discipline
- Medalist from the 2018/19 ISU Grand Prix Final

2020 ISU WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS
Tallinn, Estonia
March 2 - 8, 2020

Pursuant to ISU rules and regulations Skate Canada is entitled to a maximum of the following entries:

Men	-	2 entries
Ladies	-	2 entry
Pairs	-	2 entries
Dance	-	3 entries

With the ISU point system in place at the ISU Junior World Championships, which determines the number of entries a country will have at the following ISU World Junior Championships, and the number of entries for the ISU Junior Grand Prix Series and its impact on future entries, the decision as to the athletes to be named must meet the following eligibility requirements:

1. ISU Minimum Technical Score (Appendix i)
2. Age requirements as per ISU Rule 108:
"Skaters may compete who have met the following age requirements before July 1st preceding the event (July 1, 2019)":
 - Has reached at least the age of thirteen (13);
 - Has not reached the age of nineteen (19) for Ladies and Men in singles competition; and
 - Has not reached the age of nineteen (19) for Ladies and the age of twenty-one (21) for Men in Pair Skating and Ice Dance competition.

And will then take into account, in no specific order, the following criteria:

- Results, scores and skills performed versus age of eligible athletes / teams at the 2019-2020 ISU Junior Grand Prix Series, ISU Jr Grand Prix Final, and ISU International competitions in which Skate Canada has selected and nominated the skater(s)
- Results, scores and skills performed versus age of eligible athletes / teams at the 2020 Youth Olympic Games.
- Results, scores and skills performed versus age of eligible athletes / teams at the 2020 Canadian Championships. Athletes may be considered from Novice, Junior, or Senior categories if they meet the eligibility requirements.
- Skater / team's performances trends over the previous year based on total and technical scores achieved.

Minimum Technical Scores (ISU Communication No. 2262)

Skaters/couples participating in the following 2020 ISU Figure Skating Championships must have reached in an ISU recognized Senior International Competition during the ongoing season (2019/20) or immediately preceding season (2018/19) the applicable minimum **Technical Scores** (both for SP/RD and FS/FD) as follows:

Skaters/couples participating in the 2020 ISU World Junior Championships, must have reached in an ISU recognized Junior International Competition during the ongoing season (2019/20) or immediately preceding season (2018/19) the applicable minimum **Technical Scores** (both for SP/RD and FS/FD) as follows:

ISU World Junior Figure Skating Championships 2020:

	SP/RD	FS/FD
Junior Men	23.00	42.00.
Junior Ladies	23.00	38.00
Junior Pairs	23.00	34.00
Junior Ice Dance	23.00	37.00

The minimum Technical Scores can be reached in either the same or in two different ISU recognized International Competition

The Minimum Technical Score must be reached 21 (twenty-one) days before the first day (first official practice day) of the Championships concerned (same as entry deadline).

*****The ISU Council reserves the right to slightly re-adjust the Minimum Total Technical Scores if it became evident that the number of entries would be significantly higher or lower than expected. Skate Canada Board of Directors would therefore reserve the right to revisit athlete selection if the Minimum Total Technical score is adjusted and impacts prior selections.***
