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Message from the President of Skate Canada



It is remarkable to reflect on the conclusion of another quadrennial cycle. Over the past four years, we have made significant process in advancing our Strategic Imperatives – Skating for Life, Skating to Win, and Skating for Everyone – while continuing to strengthen the foundation of our sport across Canada.

This year, all eyes were on Canadian athletes as the 2026 Milano Cortina Olympic Winter Games showcased exceptional performances on the world stage, including a bronze medal for ice dancers Piper Gilles and Paul Poirier. This was one of more than 70 international medals earned by Canadian figure skaters and teams this year, including 20 across the Junior and Senior Grand Prix circuits and five at world championship events. Ava Kemp and Yohnatan Elizarov made history at the ISU Figure Skating Junior World Championships, becoming the

first Canadian pairs team in nearly 50 years to claim the world title. In synchronized skating, Les Suprêmes delivered an undefeated season, reclaiming the world title and securing their fourth championship win in five years.

At home, the 2026 Canadian National Skating Championships provided a memorable setting for the announcement of our Olympic team. Held for the first time at Centre Slush Puppie, the event attracted our largest crowds in more than four years. Engagement extended far beyond the rink, with digital viewership on Dailymotion and CBC Sports more than doubling to surpass 1.7 million views. Looking ahead, we are excited to introduce new initiatives to strengthen our performance excellence programming, including the integration of Synchro 9 and solo ice dance into our domestic events. At the same time, we remain committed to working closely with our Sections, clubs, and skating schools to deliver inclusive, engaging, and high-quality skating experiences nationwide.

This commitment is reflected in the continued strength of our membership, with 209,796 registrants and 7,156 coaches in 2025–2026. The conversion rate from learn-to-skate programming to figure skating reached 9.7% — the highest of this quadrennial. Satisfaction with the quality of experiences at our clubs and schools continues to rise, reinforcing that our efforts to make skating welcoming and accessible are resonating. Through our equity, diversity, inclusion and accessibility initiatives, including four Community of Practice sessions.

In spring 2026, the Canadian sport system took an important step forward with the release of the Future of Sport in Canada Commission Final Report. While challenges remain, we are encouraged by the Commission's vision and the potential for meaningful, system-wide progress that benefits all Canadians. Skate Canada has been an active contributor to this dialogue and will continue to integrate leading practices into our operations.

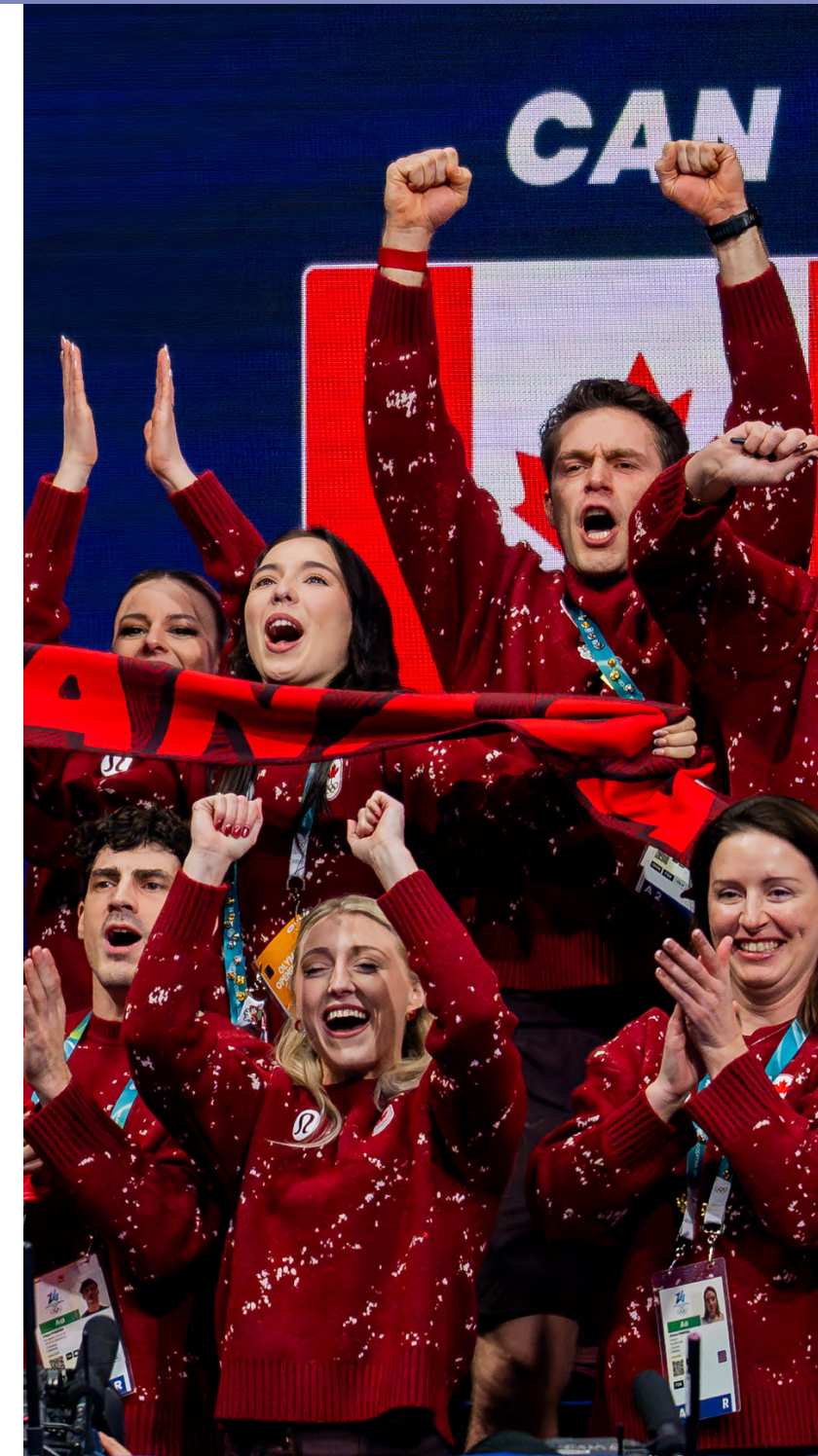

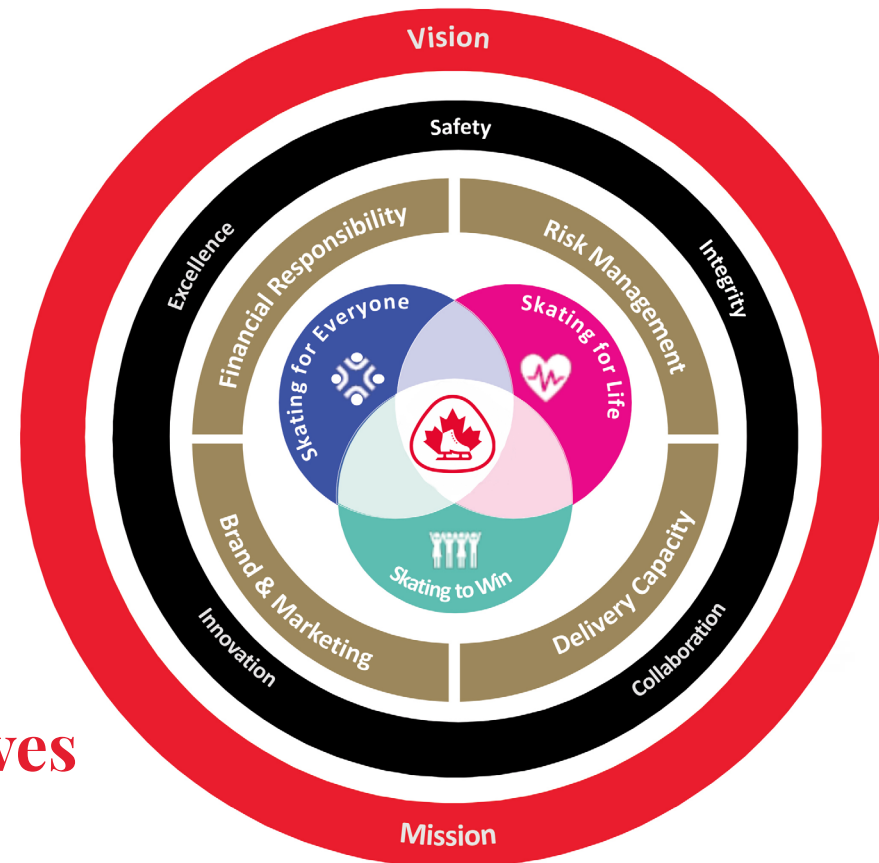

Delivery Capacity



In 2021-2022, Skate Canada decided to develop a modern version of its Competition Scoring System (CSS). Although the organization was well-served by the legacy system, it was built on aging technology and was experiencing runtime deprecation.

Following eighteen months of development, the modernized CSS was first rolled out from July through October 2023. This provided Skate Canada with the opportunity to stress test the product, as well as collect valuable feedback from stakeholders. Unfortunately, significant issues were noted, and a decision was made to delay implementation.

In the fall of 2025, the system was reintroduced at several events, including the BC/YT Synchro and Adult Competition, BC/YT Super Series Sectionals, and Skate Canada Challenge. This new version saw major improvements in the performance of the underlying database, the efficiency with which information is exchanged across the system during scoring, and the usability of the user interface.

These changes led to its full adoption as the authoritative scoring system for events across Canada.

The 2026 version of CSS has established a modern platform for future development including real-time video processing, analysis and access, remote officiating, utilization of Artificial Intelligence capabilities in training aids, official/operator support, results analysis, and fan experience.

Quadrennial Scorecard

The 2025-2026 season marked the fourth and final year of the 2022-2026 quadrennial cycle, with Skate Canada continuing to perform strongly across all its objectives. The quadrennial scorecard below details the progress made towards the organization's Strategic Imperatives over the past four years. The 2026-2030 Strategic Plan will be released in late 2026.

Highlights of the Year



Canadian athletes earned more than 70 international medals, including two World titles and one Olympic bronze medal.



Hosted five domestic events, including sold-out weekend sessions at the 2026 Canadian National Skating Championships.

Skating for Everyone



Skate Canada hosted another successful Adult Skating Camp in Mississauga, Ont., in August 2025. The three-day camp welcomed 60 participants and featured Elizabeth Manley, Kaetlyn Osmond and Dominic Barthe. Skaters took part in a variety of on- and off-ice sessions, including workshops on GOEs and Program Components, as well as a monitoring session where participants performed a program, pattern dance or individual elements.

The North American ISU Figure Skating Adult Competition was held in Alexandria, Virginia, where 30 Skate Canada participants competed across 59 categories and earned an impressive 35 medals. The Special Olympics Global Advisory met to discuss rule changes, and Skate Canada was entrusted with drafting the proposed updates to the Special Olympics International Figure Skating Rules. The proposed changes were accepted and will come into effect as of 2029.

During the 2026 Olympic Winter Games, Skate Canada partnered with the Canadian Olympic Committee and Sections to participate in the 2026 Olympic FanFest events held in Toronto, Calgary and Montreal. Volunteers, staff and coaches from local Skate Canada clubs delivered skating demonstrations and learn-to-skate experiences, showcasing the CanSkate program to attendees.

Equity, Diversity, Inclusion & Accessibility (EDIA)

Skating for Everyone continued to grow in 2025-2026 as Skate Canada strengthened its relationships with Indigenous communities, members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, and people with disabilities.

Skate Canada hosted four successful Community Skates this year, including two held in conjunction with domestic events. In partnership with Skate AB|NT|NU, Skate Nova Scotia and local clubs, 55 participants from Tsuut'ina Nation, L'istituk, Millbrook, Wasoqopaq, and Cree communities took part in an inclusive skating session. In celebration of World Ice Skating Day, 20 adult newcomers from Capital Rainbow Refuge participated in a learn-to-

skate session at the Rideau Hall Rink in Ottawa, where they received coaching instruction and skated alongside Skate Canada NextGen and Special Olympics athletes.

Our learning journey in Indigenous engagement also continued this year. National Service Centre staff participated in Water Ceremony teachings led by Elder Verna McGregor, as well as a Pow Wow and dancing demonstration at the Canadian Museum of History. At the 2026 Canadian National Skating Championships, Elder Verna delivered a welcome message in Ojibwe, and an Indigenous vendor was present to elevate Indigenous businesses. Skate Canada also launched the Indigenous Community Circle (ICC), an Indigenous-led advisory group established to help guide the organization's Indigenous engagement initiatives.

Skate Canada delivered four Community of Practice events for over 350 participants,

covering a range of topics including Gender Inclusivity and Diversity for Teams, Accessibility in Figure Skating, and Figure Skating from an Indigenous Lens. In addition, the Skating for Everyone Educational Framework – consisting of three online modules paired with facilitated virtual discussions – created a moderated space for participants to share perspectives, feedback, and new ideas.

Collecting data and self-identification information remains essential for identifying opportunities for future initiatives, informing targeted outreach, and ensuring organizational accountability through evidence-based decision-making. This year, Skate Canada undertook two initiatives: (a) the integration of self-identification data into the registration process and (b) exit surveys for those who do not re-register with Skate Canada. Skating for Life



Customized Section support for skating programs continued throughout the 2025-2026 season. In British Columbia, more than 20 coaches participated in a two-day workshop on STAR 1-5 and team coaching, while Skate Nova Scotia delivered CanSkate training to coaches and Program Assistants. Skate BC/YT, Skate PEI and Skate New Brunswick also visited local clubs to support program delivery. Feedback and action plans were provided to the clubs and coaches with strategies to strengthen compliance with program delivery standards. Expanding this support strategy will remain a key focus in the next quadrennial.

In 2025, Skate Canada launched new Pathways and eLearning materials for Singles and Ice Dance judges, offering a centralized hub of educational tools to support the ongoing development of grassroots officials. A trial judge program for Singles and Ice Dance judges was also introduced at Skate Canada Challenge in Calgary, providing enhanced development opportunities for officials from smaller Sections.

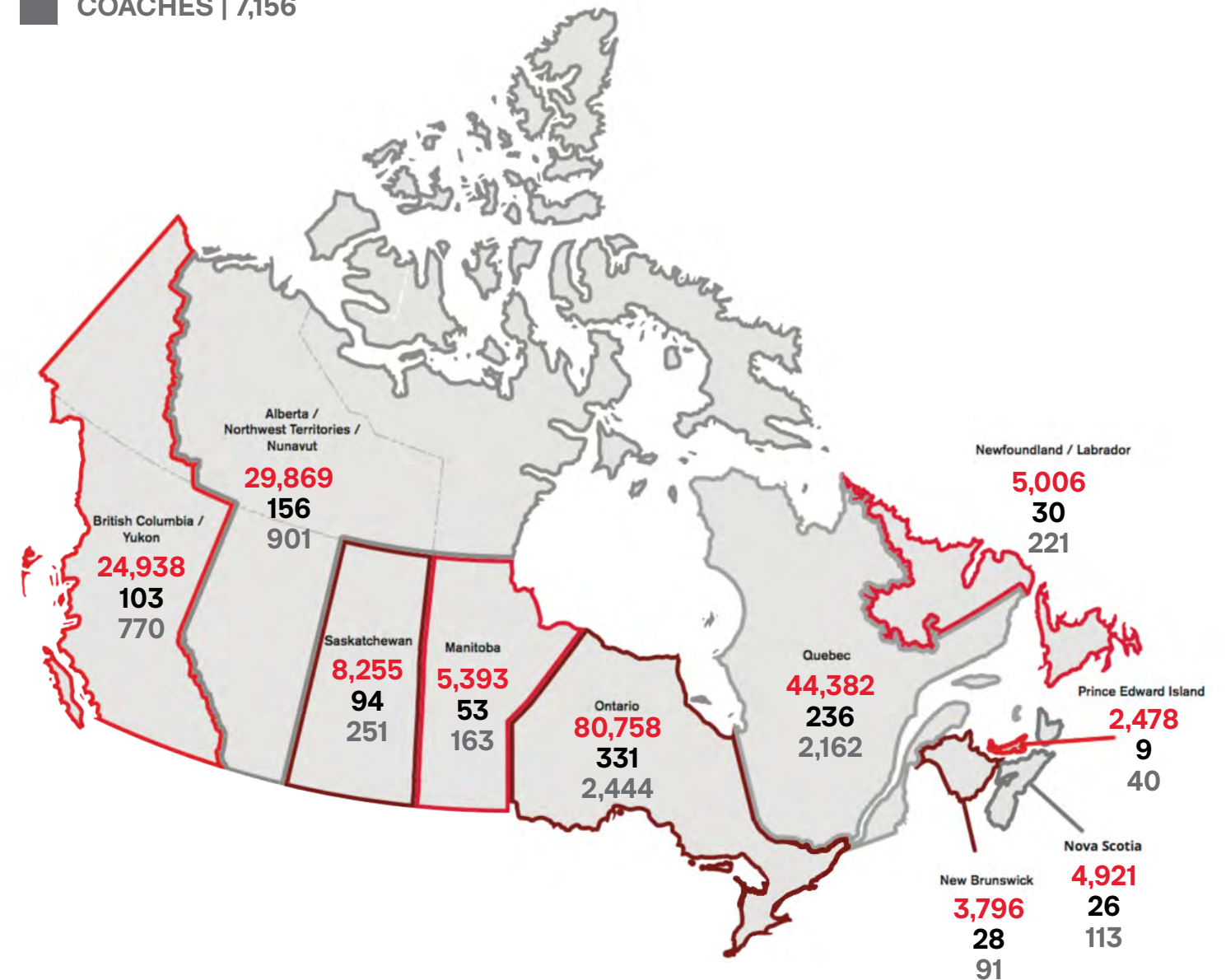
At the 2025 ISU Frankfurt Seminar, Skate Canada strengthened its international officiating presence with the successful addition of five new international officials/roles and one new ISU official/role.

This year, Skate Canada's membership once again surpassed 200,000 registrants, while the number of registered coaches exceeded 7,000 for the first time.

National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP)

Coach membership reached an all-time high this season, with more than 7,000 registered coaches across Canada. Throughout the year, coaches continued to invest in their professional development by training and upgrading their certification status. The following chart highlights the number of coaches who achieved the various training and certification milestones during the season.

These figures reflect continued engagement in NCCP coach education across all contexts, with broad participation in STAR (foundational) pathways and smaller, specialized cohorts advancing through Podium pathways.

NCCP Learning Facilitator Training: Provincial Coach (PC) Pathway

A successful three-day training session for PC Learning Facilitators was held in October 2025, focused on strengthening course delivery and facilitation skills to further enhance the coach experience for both virtual and in-person courses.



NCCP Competition-Development Advanced Gradation

Skate Canada received approval for the Competition-Development Advanced Gradation context as part of the NCCP framework, helping to bridge the gap beyond the National Coach certification pathway. The Advanced Coaching Diploma is a one-year program offered by the Canadian Olympic and Paralympic Sport Institute Network and is designed to support the continued development of high-performance coaches.

Technical Coach Seminar (TCS) Initiative

In partnership with Skate AB|NT|NU, Skate Canada successfully launched its first two-part Technical Coach Seminar (TCS) for 40 STAR and Podium Pathway coaches. The seminar focused on technical development and Long-Term Development (LTD) integration in a competitive setting. Following the success of the pilot, Skate Canada plans to expand the TCS program to all five domestic events during the 2026–2027 season.



Section-Club Support Visits

Long-Term Development (LTD) and Safe Sport workshops, combined with club and coach meetings, were delivered in Skate Nova Scotia, Skate Newfoundland Labrador, and Skate BC|YT. These sessions were designed to enhance the overall skater experience and focused on key areas including club planning and governance, program delivery, coach development, coach contracts, volunteer capacity, and dispute resolution.

Skating to Win



Skate Canada athletes demonstrated consistent success throughout the 2025-2026 international competitive season, winning 71 medals in the men's singles, women's singles, pairs, ice dance, and synchronized skating disciplines at the junior and senior levels.

Strong performances throughout the Junior and Senior Grand Prix Series resulted in six Canadian entries qualifying for the 2025-2026 ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final, where Ava Kemp and Yohnatan Elizarov claimed the bronze medal in junior pairs. Their success continued at the 2026 ISU Figure Skating Junior World Championships where they won gold, where they were joined on the pairs podium by Jazmine Desrochers and Kieran Thrasher with the silver medal.

At the 2026 Olympic Winter Games, Piper Gilles and Paul Poirier won bronze in ice dance before going on to claim silver at the 2026 ISU Figure Skating World Championships. In pairs, Lia Pereira and Trennt Michaud added to Canada's success with a World bronze medal.

Les Suprêmes reclaimed the world title at the 2026 ISU Synchronized Skating World Championships, marking their fourth World Championship title in the past five years.

National Mentorship Program (NMP)

The Virtual Coach Mentorship Program engaged 10 coaches and 4 mentor coaches, with a focus on discipline-specific technical development in ice dance and singles, as well as developing athletes in the Podium pathway.

Coach Apprenticeship Programs (CAP)

Three CAP initiatives were delivered at Skate Canada International, the Canadian National Skating Championships, and Skate Canada Cup. In partnership with Skate Saskatchewan, Patinage Québec and Skate Ontario, these programs supported the development of 49 coaches and 17 officials.

Communications

The 2026 Milano Cortina Olympic Winter Games served as the cornerstone of communication efforts this year. We seized the opportunity to connect with new audiences, elevate the profile of our athletes, expand media reach, and deepen engagement across the skating community.

Our Olympic campaign, *Skate Proud. Skate Canada.*, was activated across events, digital platforms, merchandise, and storytelling initiatives throughout the season. A key highlight was the in-person Olympic Team Announcement at the Canadian National Skating Championships, which generated significant excitement and visibility for the team. Across social media channels, Skate Canada achieved exceptional growth, increasing our total following by 23 per cent and driving a 175 per cent increase in overall engagement—clear indicators of a growing and engaged audience.

Media relations remained a top priority, with strategic efforts at both domestic and international events generating consistent year-round coverage in local, national, and global outlets. During the Olympic period alone, our athletes earned 1,500 more media mentions than in all of 2025 combined. The organization's email marketing program also evolved, incorporating new strategies to better promote ticket sales and a leveraging data to deliver more relevant, targeted content to subscribers. Our limited-edition Olympic newsletter, *The Daily Spin*, provided highly engaged fans with exclusive, behind-the-scenes updates from Milan throughout the Games.

These initiatives were supported by a robust editorial calendar highlighting stories from across the skating ecosystem—from grassroots participants to high-performance athletes—while reinforcing Skate Canada's ongoing commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusion.

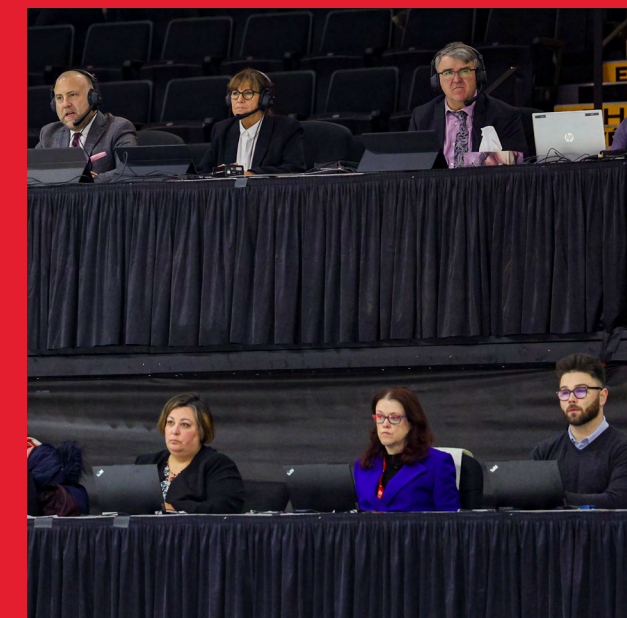
